DEMOCRATIC GOVT. POST 1994

- Constitutional Mandate
- Department of Land Affairs created
- <u>Vision</u>: An equitable and sustainable land dispensation that promotes social and economic development
- Mission: To provide access to land and to extend rights in land, with particular emphasis on the previously disadvantaged communities, within a well planned environment.

LAND RESTITUTION

- Restitution of Land Rights Act, 1994
- Dispossession after 19 June 1913
- Cut off date for claims December 1998
- 67 314 claims lodged
- Total claims settled 35 137
- Total number of beneficiaries 424 643

- Land redistribution for historically disadvantaged
- Poverty eradication
- Willing-buyer willing-seller
- LRAD

- Prevention of evictions
- Provision of secure tenure
- Challenges in communal areas

- Labour Tenants' Act, 1996
